## CREATION CLOSED WITH A LECTURE

PASTOR COLE OF CLEVELAND, O.,  
EXPLAINS TEACHINGS OF  
PASTOR RUSSELL.

Shows That the Leader of the I. B. S. A. Supports All Teachings by Contents of the Bible.

The photo-drama of Creation which has been running for the last two weeks at the Princess closed last night. Pastor James H. Cole of Cleveland, O., gave the closing address, illustrated with some of the most beautiful uncolored films selected from the drama. Many are the favorable comments that have been heard on every hand respecting the drama, which is the greatest religious production of pictures ever attempted.

The subject of Pastor Cole's lecture last night was "Pastor Russell's Teachings Examined." The speaker explained that the reason he chose this topic for his subject was not only because we have Pastor Russell to thank more than any other person for the privilege of witnessing without cost this wonderful series of lectures and pictures from which so much valuable Bible knowledge has been acquired by hundreds of our citizens who have witnessed it, but also because these teachings are scriptural, always having a "thus saith the Lord" for their support.

The speaker referred to the enormous expense these teachings are being circulated and examined by people throughout the world. That Pastor Russell's "Studies in the Scriptures" rank third in the world's literature, there being but two other books the world has ever known which have exceeded it in output, namely, the Bible and the Chinese almanac. The circulation having now reached more than seven million copies, and are being put into the hands of the public in twenty different languages at the rate of two thousand copies per day. Millions of pages of free literature are given away every year. Pastor Russell's sermons now appear in two thousand newspapers in our land, reaching it, it is estimated, about twenty million readers.

Pastor Cole said, in the limited time at his disposal, he could briefly touch but a few of the most important points of these teachings, the first of which is Pastor Russell's conception of God. That the idea that God is simply a principle, or as some express it, "God is Good and Good is God," was very unsatisfactory. That he is a living Being, the supreme, intelligent, Divine Creator, and that when we pray "Our Father," etc., we are addressing one who hears.

That the Bible is the inspired word of God in which we can put explicit confidence and trust, and from which we can secure a faith that will not shrink.

That the object God had in creating man in the beginning, in His own image and likeness, and placing him on the earth in the Garden of Eden was not to take him to heaven later if he proved worthy, not to take him anywhere rather than he might remain on the earth as its monarch to enjoy an eternity of bliss and happiness, with nothing to mar. Adam, however, broke the conditions upon which he had received the gift of eternal life, forfeiting everything, the loss being sustained as well by the whole human family. "By the disobedience of one man sin entered the world, in whom all have sinned and so death passed upon all men." Death, therefore, the speaker declared, was the penalty for sin, not withstanding what others may say to the contrary that it is eternal torment, for the word of God must stand. It is again simply stated "the wages of sin is death." Every educated Bible student knows that there is but one Hebrew

word ever translated hell, which is Sheol, and that its equivalent in the Greek is hades, and that these two words in the Bible which we all use are more times translated grave than they are translated hell. The grave, the tomb, the condition of death, oblivion, is the true meaning.

Then the speaker at some length discussed the two great, seemingly contradictory doctrines, election and free grace. He showed that election applied to the church of this age taken out of the world to become the spiritual bride of Christ, in heaven; while the free grace of God's word pertains to all the remainder of mankind, the non-elect; but is not applicable until the close of the gospel age and the ushering in of the Messianic kingdom. This, he said, would not be giving some a second chance to gain heaven, not even a first chance, but the first chance for man to get and enjoy perfect life on this earth, when it also is to be made perfect as our Lord said, Matt. 5:5, "The meek shall inherit the earth." In that day, the resurrection day, when all the dead are to be awakened and be afforded an opportunity to profit from the lessons of sin received in this life and those who desire and will make amends for all the wrong they have done, becoming perfect, pure, holy men, may share them in the Lord's kingdom for which He taught His disciples to pray, "Thy kingdom come—on earth." Those refusing, the incorrigible, together with the devil, "all the wicked, will God destroy (not preserve in fire) with everlasting destruction from the presence of the Lord."

Thus when the earth is perfect, filled with a race of perfect human beings who have tasted sin and death and can therefore fully appreciate life and happiness and enjoy it for eternity, then God's plan will be complete.

## WATERS REPORTS ON STATE FAIR

WORK MOVING ALONG NICELY  
AND CO-OPERATION FROM  
MANY OUTSIDE SOURCES.

Sends Answer to the Minnesota State Fair Encouraging the Idea of Talking Peace Instead of War in This Country.

"Peace hath her victories  
No less renowned than war."  
We are with you for peace—  
Nix on the warriors."

The above message to the Minnesota State Fair Association was sent last night by Secretary Waters of the Arkansas State Fair Association, in answer to the great movement inaugurated in Minnesota and to be spread throughout the country urging that peace and not war be the subject of all the purposes, aims and discussions of the American public.

"Flour barrels are better than gun barrels," and the encouragement of the use of "farm implements as machine guns" was the sentiment sent from the Minnesota state fair, and it met a hearty response with the directors of the Arkansas exposition, who last night assembled and received their report from Secretary Waters, which showed that splendid progress had been made in the matter of the detail of the work thus far.

The meeting was presided over by President S. W. Fordyce, who has given the state fair much of his attention, and who while here wanted to hear, with the directors, a report of just what had been accomplished. Secretary Waters was prepared for such a demand. He began by giving the directors a financial statement. There had been about \$9,800 subscribed, and a liberal portion of that paid in. The fair would have plenty of exhibits of all kinds. Applications were coming in every day, and there had been about \$2,000 worth of space sold. The catalogue had carried about \$430 in advertising, besides railroad advertising, and had cost about \$230. The opening day program had not been decided on, but would either be a big ceremonial over the opening of the Little Rock highway, or some other such incident. A trades display had been suggested. Speakers of national note were being communicated with. The governor and the national fair commission were co-operating and helping, as were the government field agents. The educational display would be bigger and better. There were special arrangements being made for a big entertainment feature which would include the bringing of several big shows here.

The report was received with enthusiasm, and Colonel Fordyce stated he was glad to hear that so much of the work had been done. He believed that if all would work together this state fair would be the biggest and best ever held in this section of the country.

Col. F. B. T. Hollenberg and Secretary Harris of the commission to look after the Arkansas display at the San Francisco exposition were present and made talks encouraging this work, and pledging their co-operation to the state fair. A motion that there be set aside a Panama-Pacific exposition day was carried, and the day will be set later, probably on the closing day of the state fair, that such exhibits as had been chosen for the California trip might have been beribboned and designated, giving an added interest to the closing day of the state fair. Mr. Belding made this latter suggestion, which will probably be carried out.

C. W. Watson, head of the government demonstration work in Arkansas, is again working hard for the success of the state fair, as he has done before, and his work will be more generally gone over at a meet-

ing to be held in Fayetteville when all his agents will be present personally.

The matter of encouraging the Saline county fair, and other county fairs in the state, was brought before the directors by Mr. Hamp Williams, and it was decided to send Mr. Williams to Benton soon to take up this matter with the business men of that city. The thanks of the directors were tendered to Messrs. Hollenberg, Harris and Watson for having come to meet with the directors of the state fair.
