Error in the Dark Ages.



Louisville, Ky.,
Jan. 17.—Pastor
Russell preached
here today at Ma-
cauley's Theater.
We report his dis-
course from the
text, "Present your
bodies a living sac-
rifice, holy, accept-
able to God, and
your reasonable
service."—Romans
12:1.

Repeatedly the
Pastor meets with people inquiring for
the Bread of Life. These seem to
know that there is something radically
wrong with nominal church preaching.
They tell that they are importuned for
money; but that when they ask for
soufflé, they meet with evasion and
subterfuge from many of the great and
learned, who seem to have lost sight
of the Bible and heart-conversion. Or
they are met by the Salvation Army
with traditions as indigestible as a
stone. They are told that God created
our race with full knowledge that
nearly all of them would spend eter-
nity in torture; and that to be saved
from that awful fate they should be-
come Salvationists, and storm the
slums for Jesus.

Master Stroke of Satan.

This eternal-torture error drives away
from God and the Bible our most in-
telligent people, who are repelled with
the thought that the Creator would
pursue a course which would be be-
neath the instincts of the most de-
graded. The Bible declares such fall-
acies to be "doctrines of demons." It
was a master stroke on Satan's part to
so misrepresent God as to repel those
desiring to draw near Him.

But to tell the people the Truth is to
anger the clergy; for it proves them to
be in the wrong. Instead of building
up the House of God, they have built
meeting-houses—seeking numbers and
popularity rather than instructing the
people in God's Word. Remarkably
few church members, he finds, know
what or why they believe. They give
very little evidence of having the
fruits of the Holy Spirit, and many of
them manifest the fruits of the Evil
Spirit—"anger, malice, hatred, envy,
strife, bitterness, slander," etc., which
the Apostles style works of the flesh
and of the Devil.—Matthew 22:20; Ga-
latians 5:17-21; 1 John 3:8.

The speaker admitted that there are
nice people connected with all denom-
inations. He complimented their edu-
cation, refinement, wealth, influence
and humanitarian sympathies, but
showed that all these belong to people
who are not church members. Partic-
ipation in good works is by no means a
proof that one is a Christian. A Chris-
tian is a person who has come into a
very special relationship to God.

In all kindness the Pastor declared
that according to Bible standards the
vast majority of church members and
of preachers are not Christians at all.
Then he thanked God that this does
not mean that the Bible condemns
them to eternal torment. But these
self-deceived ones will have no part in
the wonderful blessings Divinely pro-
vided for the elect Church—saintly per-
sons of all denominations, "whose
names are written in Heaven."

Surrender Self—Sacrifice to God.

According to Scripture no human be-
ing is fit for eternal life, because all
are sinners. Father Adam's sin cut
him off from God; and his race has de-
teriorated. But God has provided for
man's recovery from his present de-
plorable state, and has set a time
for the recovery—Messiah's Kingdom.

Meantime a special Call has gone
forth for an elect Church, to be Christ's
Joint-heir in the Kingdom. Few have
heard the Message, and still fewer be-
lieve it. For nearly nineteen centuries
it has been going hither and thither,
quietly, unostentatiously. The world
and the nominal churches would say
that it had accomplished nothing—that
everything had been accomplished by
them. But the speaker prefers to stand
by the Bible and to recognize that
God's consecrated ones have indeed
lifted up a light that the world has
hated—a light on account of which they
have frequently been put to death, or
had their names cast out as evil, or
been boycotted, socially or otherwise.

If their hopes were merely in the
present life, these would be making a
miserable failure of their opportunities.
But not so; they "walk by faith, and
not by sight." They await their future
reward—at the Second Coming of Je-
sus—by a share in His, the First Resur-
rection. Even now their peace, joy
and fellowship with God more than
offset their trials and ostracism.

To be a disciple of Christ is to be a
pupil—one who walks as He walked.
The proposition is self-denial, self-sac-
rifice. It means giving one's self
wholly to God, as declared in our text.
No one need go far to make this con-
secration. Each, at his own bedside,
can give himself to God. But unless
we take this step, and definitely and
actively enter into a covenant with
the Lord, we have neither lot nor part
with Him.

AN ORDINANCE.

Whereas more than one-fourth of the
property taxpayers of Road District
Number One of Grant parish, Louisi-
ana, eligible to vote in a tax election in
said district of said parish, have peti-
tioned the police jury to order an elec-
tion in said district to determine wheth-
er or not a special five mills tax for
five years, beginning with the year 1915
and ending with the year 1919, shall be
levied and collected on all the property
in said district subject to taxation, for
the purpose of building and maintain-
ing the public roads in said District
No. 1; and

Whereas, it is the opinion of this
body that the contemplated building
and maintenance of public roads is for
the public welfare; and

Whereas, aside from said petition, it
is the voluntary will of this body to call
the election herein provided for; and

Whereas Article 293 of the Constitu-
tion of 1913 authorizes the levying and
collection of such a tax on the property
of Road District Number One, when
authorized at an election held for this
purpose; and

Whereas Act 256 of 1910, and amend-
ments, provides the method of holding
such election; now, therefore,

Section 1—

Be it ordained by the police jury of
Grant parish, Louisiana, in regular ses-
sion convened, That an election is
hereby called to be held in Road District
Number One of this parish at Colfax
and Fairmount precincts on Thursday,
the 11th day of February, 1915, at
which election a majority of the prop-
erty taxpayers of said road district, in
number and amount, eligible to vote
and voting shall determine the propo-
sition to levy a five mills tax on all the
taxable property in said Road District
Number One in said parish for the pe-
riod of five years, beginning with the
year 1915 and ending with the year
1919, for the purpose of building and
maintaining the public roads in said
Road District Number One.

Section 2—

Be it further ordained, That the
clerk of the police jury is instructed to
prepare for use at said election a suffi-
cient number of ballots, on each of
which shall be printed substantially the
provisions mentioned in section one of
this ordinance, to-wit:

PROPOSITION.

Proposition to levy a five
mills tax on all the property
in Road District Number One,
Grant parish, Louisiana, for a
period of five years, beginning
with the year 1915 and ending
with the year 1919, both years
inclusive, for the purpose of
building and maintaining the
public roads in said Road Dis-
trict Number One, Grant parish,
Louisiana.

NOTICE TO VOTER.

To vote in favor of the proposition
submitted on this ballot place a cross
(X) mark in the square after the word
"Yes." To vote against the propo-
sition place a similar mark in the square
after the word "No."

Section 3—
Be it further ordained, That the clerk
of the police jury is instructed to have
prepared for use at said election all
necessary ballot boxes, tally sheets,
registrars lists of property taxpayers
eligible to vote in said election and the
valuation of their property, blank lists
for entering the names of those who
actually voted at said election, and com-
piled statement blanks for compiling the
votes in number and amount.

Section 4—
Be it further ordained, That the com-
pensation of the election commissioners
at said election shall be three dollars
per day for one day, for the clerk three
dollars per day for one day, for the re-
turning officer three dollars per day for
three days, and the said election shall
be held at the following polling places
and by the officers here named, each
being a registered voter:

No. 1, at Colfax—D. M. McKnight,
A. M. Goodwyn and M. E. Swafford,
commissioners; R. M. C. Duncan,
clerk; G. H. McKnight, returning officer.

No. 2, at Fairmount—B. H. Ran-
dolph, J. H. Blackshear and T. C.
Bush, commissioners; F. C. Lacour,
clerk; J. P. Lewis, returning officer.

Section 5—
Be it further ordained, That notice
of this election containing the propo-
sition herein submitted to the voters
shall be prepared and signed by the
president and secretary of the police
jury and shall be published in the official
journal four weekly insertions, the
date of the first insertion to be not less
than thirty days before the date of the
election. The said notice shall further
recite that on Saturday, the 13th day
of February, 1915, at 12 o'clock noon,
the police jury will meet at the court
house in Colfax, in said parish, and
there in public session open the ballot
boxes, examine and count the ballots
both as to number and amount, and
examine and count the returns and de-
clare the result of said election and
promulgate the same.
