DR. GILFILLAN AT EASTLAKE

Will Conduct Series of Evangelistic Meetings, Beginning Tomorrow

MUSIC TO BE A SPECIAL FEATURE

LAWFUL ON THE SABBATH.

Luke 13:10-17; 14:1-6—March 15.

"The Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the Sabbath."—Mark 2:27.

Much confusion prevails amongst Christian people respecting the Sabbath. Few realize that God's arrangements with the followers of Jesus are totally different from those which He made with Natural Israel under the Law Covenant. Everything under that Covenant contained a valuable lesson for Christians; but to mistake the type for the antitype is to confuse our minds and miss the beauty and force of the antitype.

There was no Sabbath before the Jewish Law, except that God rested on the seventh day, or Epoch, of the Creative Week. Enoch, Abraham, and others pleased to the Lord, knew nothing about the Sabbath, even as they knew nothing about the Atonement Day sacrifices, or other matters appertaining to Israel's Law Covenant.
