The May Pre-Millennial Bible conference will meet Thursday and Friday afternoons and evenings, May 21 and 22, in Westminster Presbyterian church, with the Rev. Marcus Scott, of Berlin, Ont., formerly of Detroit, as the principal speaker. Thursday afternoon, Dr. Scott will speak on "Christ's promise, presence and plan," and in the evening on "The Christian's three-fold attitude." Friday afternoon, Dr. Scott will speak on "The coming of the bridegroom," and in the evening on "Is Christ coming again? What says the Book?" The committee in charge of the conference includes Dr. M. W. Lau, the Rev. C. E. Conley, and the Rev. Christopher Burnett.

Louis Wallis, of Chicago, will occupy the pulpit of Unitarian church Sunday morning and evening, the subject of his addresses being "The new issues of democracy" and "Social oxy and religion."
