M'BRIDE TALKS ON POSTAL SERVICE

SUPERINTENDENT OF THIS DISTRICT OF THE POSTAL SERVICE VISITED FARGO — MET WITH BUSINESS MEN—CANNOT ACT IN THE MATTER.

Frank F. McBride of St. Paul, the superintendent of this division of the postal service was in the city yesterday and talked over the postal service out of Fargo with a number of business men.

At the post office the superintendent had a conference with the postmaster regarding certain service for the local office. In the afternoon he met a number of business men at the commercial club to discuss the service out of Fargo on the Southwestern and Soo lines.

As the situation now stands Fargo jobbing houses have been receiving very poor service north on the Soo. Mail leaving here in the morning would sometimes not reach towns on the Soo until after twenty-four hours. Twin city job houses have been able to compete with the Fargo houses relative to mail service.

It appears that the Soo line train which runs north from Valley City leaves that city twenty minutes before N. P. train No. 3 reaches Valley City in the morning. Train No. 3 carries a lot of Fargo mail and any mail for Soo line towns north of Valley City on No. 3 must lay over there twelve hours or more.

The division superintendent cannot do anything for the benefit of the Fargo business men. The only way that there can be a change made is to have the time of the trains made different and thus give Fargo better service.

A representative of the Forum inquired at the post office today to secure information for the merchants and business men regarding under what terms they could get the best mail service out of here on the Soo.

Mail placed in the post office in the afternoon not later than 4:30 and at the least, can get out on the Soo line towns that same evening. The letters will leave Fargo on No. 1 of the N. P. and be transferred at Valley City. Packages being mailed here in the evening cannot get out until the next morning going west and miss connections at Valley City by eighteen minutes.

If the business men of the city are careful they can also secure fast service to Chicago. By posting the mail with the local office at not later than 3 p. m., the Chicago mail will get out on No. 4 of the Northern Pacific and will reach the windy city at 10:30 the next morning, making remarkable time.

FARGO TO HEAR GREAT SPEAKERS

SPLENDID LECTURE COURSE ATTRACTIONS SECURED FOR THE COMING MONTHS—HELD AT A. C. ARMORY—F. J. HENRY IS THE FIRST SPEAKER.

The committee in charge of the Citizens lecture course announced today the list of speakers and attractions that they have secured for Fargoans for the coming fall and winter months. The list includes some of the most noted men of the nation and will afford high class entertainment.

There will be five numbers and each will be given at the A. C. armory. The course includes four speakers, Francis J. Henry, Frank G. Cannon, Sen. Thos. P. Gore and John E. Gunckel, and the fifth attraction is the Wisconsin Glee and Mandolin club.

Definite dates have not yet been secured but will be announced as soon as possible. The first speaker, however, will be Francis J. Henry, the San Francisco prosecutor, who has worldwide fame as a public prosecutor of graft. Henry is the man who was shot and badly injured during a trial in San Francisco, when it seemed certain that he about to "get" the men "higher up." He will be here some time during November.

The next speaker will be Sen. Thos. P. Gore, the blind senator from Oklahoma. He was the first senator from Oklahoma and is a brilliant orator. For a blind man to win his way to the United States Senate shows that he must be a man with a remarkable intellect. He will also be here some time in November.

The third attraction will undoubtedly be the University of Wisconsin Glee and Mandolin club. It is probable that Chas. Pollock, the Fargo boy, son of Judge Chas. A. Pollock, will be with the club. They will be here some time during the holiday season. There will be forty-five Wisconsin students in the club and they will take a trip to the coast in a special car.

Of the other two numbers it is probable that John Gunckel will be here in January. The committee believes that Mr. Gunckel will be the feature attraction of the course. He is the man who established the Toledo Newsboys' association, an organization which has transformed the boy life of Toledo and has gained a world-wide reputation. He has a remarkable personality. The Toledo Newsboys' association owns a big building with a great auditorium in connection. They have a gymnasium in the building, clubrooms, dormitories and a rest home for the boys.

It is probable that in connection with Mr. Gunckel's visit there will be a banquet for the newsboys and newspaper men of Fargo and Moorhead at which Mr. Gunckel will be the guest of honor.

The last number of the course will be Frank J. Cannon, first U. S. senator from Utah. He gained a national reputation as the man who put polygamy out of business among the Mormons. He makes some remarkable disclosures of present-day Mormonism and says that Mormonism is still a live issue.


