VETERANS AT GRACE CHURCH

Rev. Reed to Preach Memorial Day Sermon to Nation's Heroes

ASTOR HAS NEW SPECIAL SERMON SERIES

In Grace Church tomorrow morning Dr. George E. Reed will by invitation of the Grand Army, deliver a sermon appropriate to Memorial Sunday. Delegation from the G. A. R. and various patriotic orders will be present. The central tier of seats in the auditorium will be reserved for the veterans and their friends, and the room appropriately decorated with the national colors. The service promises to be one of great interest.

In the evening Dr. Reed will deliver the first of a series of brief sermons on "The Book and Its Story," "The Story of the Early Manuscripts and Versions or How We Got the Bible."

SONG SERMON AS A LECTURE

First Presbyterian Congregation to Hear "Eventide Reflections"

PASTOR HAS SPECIAL MORNING SERMON THEME

"The Reverence of Silence," will be the theme of the morning sermon in the First Presbyterian Church, Market street, above Ninth, by the Rev. J. Ross Stonestifer, minister, tomorrow. Sunday school, including the men's class taught by the minister, will meet in the church auditorium, at 2 o'clock. Y. P. S. C. E. services will be held at 2 o'clock, led by a committee of delegates to the recent Northfield conference.
